Introduction to Capital Health Network

 - Improving the efficiency and effectiveness of health services for people, particularly those at risk of poor health outcomes.
 - Improving the coordination of health services, and increasing access and quality support for people.

Funding: Department of Health and Aged Care To help older Australians maintain their quality of life in the community for longer and avoid preventable hospitalisations.

This activity is to:

• support older people residing in the community, aged 65 and over or Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged 50 and over through the delivery of early intervention activities in the ACT that promote healthy ageing, slow decline and support the ongoing management of chronic conditions


- upskill health professionals in primary care to better support older people in community
- improve care experience and better transition of care for community-based older people in the primary care space
- upskill family members/ carers to support older persons

A total of **\$503,737.23 (GST-exclusive)** is available to fund two to three service providers who will be contracted through CHN's procurement process.

The funding is to undertake activities from 1 July 2024 to 30 June 2025.

- 4. All amounts included in the proposed budget must be GST-exclusive.

Service deliverables and reporting requirements



- 1. Initial kick off meeting within first four weeks from execution of agreement
- 2. Six monthly performance reports and audited acquittals
- 3. Performance reports will include details of agreed outcome measures relevant to the activities and target population using the ICHOM Set of Patient-Centered Outcome Measures for older person
- 4. Status meetings (monthly during implementation then quarterly)
- 5. De-identified case study if required



Important considerations when applying



- 1. Please refer closely to the EOI documents and application form to provide the most tailored response for this tender.
- 2. Please stick to the word limits on the response form. Words outside of the limit will not be considered in the assessment of your application.
- 3. Proposed activity/ies need to address local health needs as identified in CHN Needs Assessment.
- 4. All activity/ies need to be completed by <u>30 June 2025</u>, with no option for extension.
- 5. Budget need to be carefully considered when applying.
- 6. Refer to Aged Care Quality Standards as guiding principles to design activities.
